### Acts 10: 34-43

<sup>34</sup>Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, <sup>35</sup>but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. <sup>36</sup>You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. <sup>37</sup>That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: <sup>38</sup>how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. <sup>39</sup>We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; <sup>40</sup>but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, <sup>41</sup>not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. <sup>42</sup>He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. <sup>43</sup>All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

man being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; <sup>22</sup>for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. <sup>23</sup>But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. <sup>24</sup>Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. <sup>25</sup>For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. <sup>26</sup>The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

### **Luke 24: 1-12**

<sup>1</sup>But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. <sup>2</sup>They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, <sup>3</sup>but when they went in, they did not find the body. <sup>4</sup>While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. <sup>5</sup>The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. <sup>6</sup>Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, <sup>7</sup>that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." <sup>8</sup>Then they remembered his words, <sup>9</sup>and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. <sup>10</sup>Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. <sup>11</sup>But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. <sup>12</sup>But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.



### **TE WAIPOUNAMU**

The Electoral College called to find a new bishop for the Anglican Maori Diocese of Te Wai Pounamu has ended without producing a nomination.

After eight ballots the college remained deadlocked late on Saturday afternoon - and when the Commissary, Bishop Victoria Matthews, proposed that it should adjourn, and officially deem its work "incomplete", the members agreed, without dissent.

The General Secretary, Rev Michael Hughes, says the process to choose a successor for the late Bishop John Gray is therefore suspended "while the Primates determine when the college may be able to engage again at a later date."

## FROM ARCHBISHOP WINSTON HALAPUA ...



See those guys in the dirt under that floor?

They're the Easter message for me. During the worst that Tropical Cyclone Winston could throw at their *koro*, or village - and Fiji has never known a cyclone of such terrible and destructive force - they sheltered there.

They spent four hours huddled together, with five other members of their family. Soaked. Waiting, with lotu<sup>[1]</sup> and trembling, for the angel of death to pass.

They emerged from under the floor to new life.

Under that floor to me - that looks like the tomb.

And underneath the floor, you have the generations.

There's the grandfather on the left, there's the daughter-in-law, and that's the grandchild.

Three generations: on Good Friday, we were all under the floor.

On Easter Day, we arise from there.

But when the people of Maniava came

out from under their floors, there was nothing.

Nothing left standing.

But we are going to build again.

Together.

We're already doing so.

We're already beginning to build a new and better life.

That's the hope of Easter.

The beautiful valley of Ra has known devastation this Lent.

The neat and ordered village of Maniava has known the cruelty of chaos.

When I arrived in Maniava, I saw the terrible impact that Tropical Cyclone Winston had made.

As I paused and took breath, I looked at the people.

I saw in them the face of Christ.

In their eyes, I saw sadness.

But despite everything, I also saw hope.

Yes, there is hope.

I celebrated the Easter Day Eucharist above those floorboards in 2014.

Directly above where those three in the photo are huddled.  
We gathered in the home of the chief, the *turaga ni koro* (village headman) - which is where Maniava has always met for worship.

And one of the messages this year for me is that while many will celebrate Easter Day in magnificent places... there are other people who will celebrate a very powerful Easter - but with no roof above them, and no shelter around them.

How do we and others continue to help here?

Well, the devastation caused to Fijian homes, businesses, plantations, schools, community halls, churches, electricity lines, wharfs, bridges, and boats has to be seen to be believed. But people *are* caring for one another. They are pulling together to help. The Prime Minister and the Government here have acted promptly and effectively to co-ordinate rescue and relief work, and what Australia and New Zealand have already given is greatly appreciated.

But there is an issue here that lies beneath what has happened.

It's not an issue that we can afford to go into, right now.

But it's there, nonetheless, and I firmly believe it's the reason why this cyclone was so destructive.

And that's the issue of climate change. What I'm saying to Australia and New Zealand is that it's good that you help us so generously.

You know it.

But we also desperately need to address climate change.

We need to limit the global average temperature increase to 1.5 degrees C above pre-industrial levels.

Will you help us in that way, too?

### **Health and Safety Workshops H&S Requirements for Churches**

New Health and Safety legislation will come into force in April that will affect Churches and the way we engage with our people on a daily basis. In response, the Inter-Church Bureau (ICB) is holding information workshops nationwide to help churches work through what the changes will mean for them.

ICB has been active in observing, analysing, and reviewing developments in the proposed health and safety reforms, and are taking steps to keep all Christian Churches up to date on developments.

The spirit of these workshops is about being better informed of our responsibilities in a church context under the new legislation, and looking at ways to do all that is practicably possible to ensure the safety of those who are in our care and who enjoy our hospitality in the course of our work and ministries.

These ecumenical events, to be held in various regions in the coming months, will be of real value to church-community leaders, church property managers, trustees and front-line pastoral and administrative staff. They will be presented by staff from consultancy Paul Divers Associates and hosted by ICB and local Church communities.

It is hoped two attendees from each local church community/parish or church trust can attend. You will be provided with a comprehensive workbook which includes information on the legislation and its requirements, as well as practical forms and processes for you to implement straight away in your local Church community.
