¹Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. ²So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, ³saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" ⁴Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, ⁵"I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. ⁶As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. ⁷I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' ⁸But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' ⁹But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' ¹⁰This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. ¹¹At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. ¹²The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. ABOUT KEEPING A VIGIL

Today we keep this day before Anzac Day as a Vigil. In the Church a Vigil signifies the anticipation of what is to come, e.g. many Anglican Churches observe vigils the evening prior to a great festival, for saints days and other commemorations. For example, in the first week of May we are asked to observe the “Vigil and Eve of Ascension Day” at Evening Prayer on Wednesday the 4th. However as church going observances have changed over the years and evening services are more and more rare, Vigils tend to be observed for major feasts and commemorations in daily services and often on a Sunday nearest. Thus today this Cathedral is observing a Vigil for Anzac Day. This means that we will anticipate in music and prayer, the coming full expression and observances that will begin early tomorrow morning in our community. As we do this we keep the faith with the call of Christ “to remember” him, and so deepen our awareness that we are not to forget the author of our peace and also to anticipate the remembrances that will be taking place of any who have gone before us. So welcome to members of the RSA and others of our New Zealand forces present this morning. We hope that in this time of keeping the Vigil of what you all will lead us in tomorrow, will bring you not only the reassurance of the peace that Christ came to give us all, but also that we all will be renewed and strengthened in everything we do to honour both the past and the present in the name of our Lord.

COMMEMORATING ANZAC DAY ...

In 1914, the Great Powers of the World went to war, in what would become called, naively, the War to end all Wars. Despite strong beliefs on all sides that the war would be a short one, it quickly developed into a stalemate in appalling trench conditions. New Zealand and Australia were fast to answer Britain's call for military forces and the ANZAC force was born. The strategically important Dardanelles straight was well defended by the Ottoman Empire, thus restricting the ability of the Russian Navy to move from its ports into the Mediterranean. After a failed Naval bombardment it became clear that in order to take the heights, an Army would have to be landed. The newly trained ANZAC force, at that point based in Egypt was selected for the task and on the morning of 25 April 1915, they stormed the beaches of Gallipoli. The conditions were atrocious and the death toll high. 2779 dead and over 5000 wounded. Australian losses were worse still and British losses were even worse, though even combined, they pale in comparison to the losses suffered by the defenders.

After several months without being able to take the position, Gallipoli was abandoned. Gallipoli has been called New Zealand's baptism of fire, though the horrors of Passchendaele saw the greatest sacrifice of New Zealand lives with 845 killed in a single day.

On 25 April 1916, the first commemorations of the landings were held and it has

been a feature of considerable national commemoration since. 16032 New Zealanders died during the First World War, though it was not, as hoped the War to end all Wars. 24 years after Gallipoli, a new generation fought the Second World War, and 11,928 of them paid the ultimate sacrifice in that conflict. Since the Second World War, New Zealand has participated in many conflicts including Korea, Malaya, the Malayan Emergency, Borneo, Vietnam, the first Gulf War, Rwanda, Timor-Leste and Afghanistan, to say nothing of the many United Nations missions we have participated in. Since the Second World War we have lost over 130 armed personnel in various conflicts we have been engaged in.

Commemorations are about remembrance and giving thanks for the sacrifices that have been made by so many over so many years. As the significance of these commemorations grows in the national psyche, it is important that great Cathedrals are a part of those commemorations. On the eve of Anzac Day, Waiapu Cathedral is privileged to hold this Vigil for Anzac Day as we remember those known to us who paid the ultimate sacrifice as well as the sacrifices made by members of this parish. The ultimate lesson to be learnt from war is to strive for peace, but in doing so, we do not forget the sacrifices so bravely made for the world we live in today.

Lest we forget.

This stage production, presented by the Kahurangi Maori Dance Company, is a 60min performance based on a collection of stories and memoirs of the late **Rev'd Canon Wi Te Tau Huata**.

As a young man, Koro Wi enlisted for service in WWII as a Chaplain (3rd Generation Anglican Minister), in June 1943. After briefly training as a soldier at Trentham Military Camp he sailed with the 10th Re-enforcements to Egypt, to join the 28th Maori Battalion with a rank of Captain, in July of that year.

Koro Wi had many duties as a Padre and Officer and was often seen searching the battlefield for wounded and bodies amongst the debris of shelling and small fire-arms, for which he would later receive a Military Cross (which he gifted to the St. Matthews Anglican Church Parish, Paki Paki where it is displayed today.)

This production is a tribute by the Kahurangi Artistic Director, late Tama Turanga Huata to his father, Canon Wi Te Tau Huata.
