## TODAY'S READINGS ... FROM THE NEW REVISED STANDARD VERSION BIBLE

### Acts 2: 1-21

<sup>1</sup>When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup>And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup>Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. <sup>4</sup>All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

<sup>5</sup>Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem.

<sup>6</sup>And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. <sup>7</sup>Amazed and astonished, they asked,

"Are not all these who are speaking Galileans?" <sup>8</sup>And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? <sup>9</sup>Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, <sup>10</sup>Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes,

<sup>11</sup>Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." <sup>12</sup>All were amazed and perplexed,

saying to one another, "What does this mean?" <sup>13</sup>But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

<sup>14</sup>But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say.

<sup>15</sup>Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. <sup>16</sup>No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

<sup>17</sup>'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,

and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.

<sup>18</sup>Even upon my slaves, both men and women,

in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy.

<sup>19</sup>And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist.

<sup>20</sup>The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.

<sup>21</sup>Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

<sup>25</sup> Lord how manifold are your works: in wisdom you have made them all, the earth is full of your creatures.

<sup>26</sup> There is the great and mighty sea: which teems with living things both great and small.

<sup>28</sup> All these look to you:  
to give them their food in due season.  
<sup>29</sup> What you give them they gather up:  
when you open your hand,  
they are filled with good things.  
<sup>30</sup> But when you hide your face  
they are dismayed:  
when you take away their breath they die,  
and return to the dust they came from.  
<sup>31</sup> When you send out your spirit  
they are created:  
and you renew the face of the earth.  
<sup>32</sup> May your glory O Lord endure for ever:  
may you rejoice O Lord in your works.  
<sup>33</sup> When you look at the earth it trembles:  
when you touch the mountains they smoke.  
<sup>34</sup> I will sing to the Lord as long as I live:  
I will praise my God while I have my being.  
<sup>35</sup> May my meditation please the Lord:  
as I show my joy in God.

### **Romans 8: 14-17**

<sup>14</sup>For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. <sup>15</sup>For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" <sup>16</sup>it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, <sup>17</sup>and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

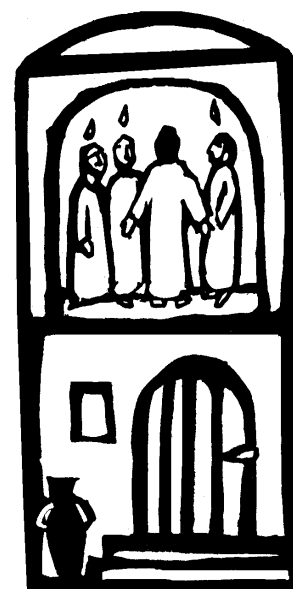
### **John 14: 8-27**

<sup>8</sup>Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." <sup>9</sup>Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? <sup>10</sup>Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father

who dwells in me does his works. <sup>11</sup>Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. <sup>12</sup>Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. <sup>13</sup>I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. <sup>14</sup>If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

<sup>15</sup>"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. <sup>16</sup>And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. <sup>17</sup>This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.

<sup>25</sup>"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. <sup>26</sup>But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. <sup>27</sup>Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid.





## FROM THE ACTING-DEAN ...

Well an amazing week we have been through as a Cathedral Parish. Highs and lows, goods and bads, all the emotions have been exercised – but in the midst of this God has been deeply present.

I want to focus in this comment on three positives.

However, having been questioned as to whether I swept the news of the Dean being stood down under the carpet last Sunday, I will respond: 1) It was simply not appropriate to address a private and confidential matter in public with the potential media present and with so many young people in the congregation. The attendance was approximately 10 times the 'normal'. Individuals did make their own statements / protests in their own respectful ways. There were also some amazing moments of God's grace which would not have happened if we had addressed the issues. 2) This is a private and confidential matter and therefore there is no more information that can be shared other than the letter from Bishop Andrew.

The positives.

Approximately 560 people gathered at our Cathedral to open General Synod in worship. The Diocesan and Cathedral teams achieved greatness in the glory of God. We achieved Three Tikanga in Waiapu tradition worship. Many people made this happen, almost every Cathedral parishioner contributed their bit, big or small, to the hosting and success of this worship. Thank You. I am aware that as a Cathedral you are used to this, we are a Cathedral that is also a Parish. This is something I really want to understand in my time with

you – What does it mean to be a Cathedral that is also a parish?

The Diocesan Team along with others have been a part of the hosting of and providing Chaplaincy and Worship at General Synod – Te Hinota Whanui. It has been a great honour to have General Synod in our Diocese and a great privilege to serve our guests in these ways. From airport pick-ups, to assisting in shopping trips, opening each day with Eucharist, Morning and Evening Prayer.

Our Cathedral has hosted the Religious Orders Prayer Presence for General Synod. To encompass, surround, encapsulate General Synod in Prayer is essential to its deliberations. I know General Synod felt held in prayer, and I delighted in seeing the Cathedral used in this way.

It has been a huge week in the life of the Cathedral. Some difficult some to celebrate. Over the week and weeks to come we need to be gentle on each other, listen to different points of view, find ways to work together and focus on that which is most important.

As we gather around the Festivals of Pentecost and Trinity Sunday, I invite you to reflect on what is important to us as a Cathedral community. Is the Trinity central to who we are, what is broken open to you this year in the Pentecost readings.

I invite you to explore with me what being a Cathedral to the Community and the Diocese means for us as we journey in relationship with the Trinity.

Thank you for your contributions to the Cathedral Community – Abundant Blessings.
