¹ My friends, if anyone is detected in a trans-
gression, you who have received the Spirit
should restore such a one in a spirit of gen-
tleness. Take care that you yourselves are
not tempted. ² Bear one another's burdens,
and in this way you will fulfill the law of
Christ. ³ For if those who are nothing think
they are something, they deceive them-
selves. ⁴ All must test their own work; then
that work, rather than their neighbour's
work, will become a cause for pride. ⁵ For all
must carry their own loads.

⁶ Those who are taught the word must share
in all good things with their teacher.

⁷Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. ⁸If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. ⁹So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. ¹⁰So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

¹¹See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! ¹²It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. ¹³Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. ¹⁴May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. ¹⁵For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! ¹⁶As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

Luke 10: 1-11, 16-20

¹After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. ²He said to them, “The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. ³Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. ⁴Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. ⁵Whatever house you enter, first say, ‘Peace to this house!’ ⁶And if anyone is there who

shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. ⁷Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. ⁸Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; ⁹cure the sick who are there, and say to them, ‘The kingdom of God has come near to you.’ ¹⁰But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, ¹¹‘Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.’

¹⁶“Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me.”

¹⁷The seventy returned with joy, saying, “Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!” ¹⁸He said to them, “I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. ¹⁹See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. ²⁰Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven.”

The 4 T's -

Thanksgiving for Treasure, Time & Talents

By now you may well be aware that we are in a time of Thanksgiving. If you have not received your Giving Brochure, copies are available for you.

Thanksgiving is, and certainly can be used as church jargon for Treasures, Planned Dedicated Financial Giving or Stewardship.

But Thanksgiving is so much more than money.

The Offertory, which is, and certainly can be used as church jargon for give us your money is so much more than money.

When we come to the Offertory we bring three things:

- ⊙ **Our Gifts** – giving back to God some of that which we have been blessed with, 'Through your goodness we have these gifts to share'.
- ⊙ **The Bread & Wine** – 'by God's Holy Spirit bread and wine are for us the body and blood of Christ Jesus', 'bread and wine; the gifts of God for the people of God'.
- ⊙ **Ourselves** – all that we have and are, warts and all, we bring our true selves to God at Christ's banquet, 'Come God's people, come to receive Christ's heavenly food'.

All three are important offerings.

Thanksgiving and Offertory are far more than money, than our Treasures.

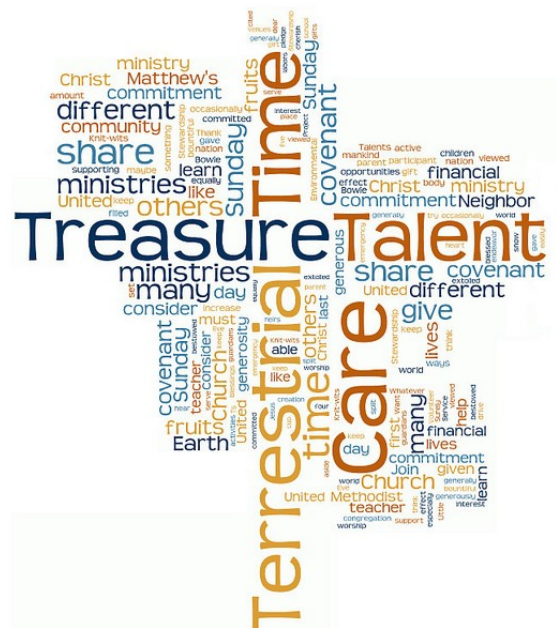
We give thanks to God for ourselves, our Time and our God-given Talents. How we see the use of our time and our talents are our ministries.

Ministries can be seen to be lived out in the church and the world.
