²To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae:
Grace to you and peace from God our Father.
- ³In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, ⁴for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵because of the hope laid up for you in heaven.

You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel⁶ that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God.⁷ This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf,⁸ and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

⁹For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding,¹⁰ so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God.

¹¹May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light.¹³ He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son,¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

Luke 10: 25-37

²⁵Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"²⁶ He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?"²⁷ He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself."²⁸ And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

²⁹But wanting to justify himself, he asked

Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?"³⁰ Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead."³¹ Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side.³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side.³³ But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity.³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him.³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.'³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?"³⁷ He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."



FROM THE ANGLICAN TAONGA ...

Inching towards cathedral resolution

Gerry Brownlee, the minister responsible for Christchurch's reconstruction, has named the members of a working group which will help decide the fate of Christ Church cathedral.

Gerry Brownlee, who is the 'Greater Christchurch Regeneration' Minister, announced the five-strong group which will recommend the best way forward for the stricken Christ Church cathedral.

The group comprises:

- National Party regional chair Roger Bridge;
- Christchurch developer Alisdair Cassels;
- Former New Zealand Transport Agency head Geoff Dangerfield;
- Academic and consultant Sue McKenzie, and;
- Former Christchurch Earthquake Authority (CERA) general manager Steve Wakefield.

Both Roger Bridge and Steve Wakefield are Church Property Trustees (CPT) appointments; while Geoff Dangerfield and Sue McKenzie were chosen by Gerry Brownlee. Alisdair Cassels is the nominee of the Great Christchurch Buildings Trust, which is the group which has campaigned for the full restoration of the broken cathedral.

Mr Brownlee today acknowledged "the strong public interest in what is happening to this iconic building.

"I know people want to see the CPT able to reach a decision so that the city can move forward.

"The Working Group will be reporting back on a way forward by 28 November 2016 and it will provide a final report to the Crown and CPT by 7 December 2016."

Engineers were this week checking and fitting new markers to the outside walls of the cathedral which gauge how much these are moving.

The church has also just released drone footage which graphically illustrates damage inside the cathedral, and Bishop Victoria Matthews has commented on the latest developments:

"Back in 2010 and 2011 the Diocese of Christchurch said we would put people and safety first and we have kept our word.

"The film from the drone in the Cathedral shows severe damage from many earthquakes including the February and March quakes this year.

"I look forward to what the working group recommends for the beloved Cathedral building.

"It's a big ask but I do know the life of the city of Christchurch will always be linked closely to the Anglican Cathedral...

"I believe in the foreseeable future we will again have a Cathedral in the Square... (though) what I am not able to say today is what that wonderful Cathedral will look like."

In the meantime, she said, visitors and citizens would continue to visit the Transitional Cathedral and "celebrate its innovation and superb design."

A farewell service will be held for **The Reverend Tim Barker** Priest- Missioner of St Peter's Riverslea and St James Mahora Parishes, will be held on **Friday 17th July at 5pm at St James, Duke Street, Hastings**. A shared supper will follow. The service will be hosted by Bishop Andrew Hedge. All are welcome to attend. **Tim will be installed as Vicar of the Parish of Taradale, service to be held at All Saints' Church, Taradale, on Tuesday 2nd August 2016 at 7pm.**

Bishop Andrew has announced that **the Reverend Jenny Chalmers** is the Vicar-elect of **St Andrew's, Taupo Parish**.

Jenny has held the position of Vicar of St Mark's, Carterton for the past eight years. Within that time and with the support of the parish, she has assisted with many community-based projects including the re-establishing of a worshipping congregation at a disused country church, and establishing a small social services unit running Season's Growing through Grief. Jenny's love for the Word of God and a desire to proclaim that Word to the community has been an important part of her ministry in Carterton.

Jenny is not new to Waiapu; from 2004 to 2007 she held the position of Vicar of Rotorua before moving to Carterton. She will be installed into her new role in October.

Bishop Andrew has announced that the **Rev'd Dr Howard Pilgrim** has been appointed as Priest-in-Charge of **Mahora/Riverslea Parish** following the Rev'd Tim Barker's final service as Priest Missioner on Sunday 17th July. Howard will commence on Monday 18th July, working on a half-time basis, dividing his time between Mahora & Riverslea.

Te Hapara Church to close

Changing demographics and a corresponding decline in the number of worshippers have brought an end to an era for one of Gisborne's oldest Anglican church buildings. Today (10th July) the morning service in **The Church of Resurrection, Te Hapara**, will be its last, after 60 years of regular Anglican worship at the site and nearly a century in the Te Hapara neighbourhood. But the church buildings will continue to serve the community.

While described as a closing and thanksgiving service, Reverend Stephen Donald, Vicar of Te Hapara Parish between 1994 and 2004, prefers to think of the service as "celebrating the past and looking forward to a brighter future". With declining worshippers across the city's Anglican churches, Rev Donald says it is better to pool resources, with the focus now on Holy Trinity Church, where Rev Donald has been priest in charge of the now-amalgamated Gisborne Anglican Parish since October 2015.

The Church of the Resurrection opened at Easter 1917 on a site in Cook Street. In 1956, Anglicans bought a property at 776 Childers Road and, in 1972, shifted the Church of the Resurrection from Cook Street on to the Childers Road site. Today the focus of the church is more on providing social services, which will continue at the Childers Road site.
