Welcome to all who are worshipping here today. Children are most welcome.

We seek to be an inclusive congregation: *Nau mai, haere mai tatou katoa.*

This morning's service follows the Eucharistic Liturgy '**Thanksgiving and Praise**' commencing on **page 476** in the **New Zealand Prayer Book**. Congregational responses are in **bold type**.

The congregation remain seated while the choir sing an Introit from the baptistery, then all stand to sing the Processional Hymn (overleaf).

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IMPORTANT HEALTH NOTICE: Our Diocese has directed parishes to **refrain** from the practice of intinction (**dipping the wafer into the wine**). For health reasons please co-operate with this requirement. Receiving the bread only is still regarded as a full expression of the sacrament, or you can simply hold or receive the chalice and then pass it back to the person serving. *Intinction is less hygienic than the common cup.*
